




ZF 15-17 Aerial Map















Council calls bond and Charter amendment elections

The Richardson City Council voted last month to call for four bond propositions and 83 charter amendment propositions to be placed on the Nov. 3 ballot. No tax rate increase would be associated with any of the bond propositions being proposed

Bond Election

A \$115 million bond package is being offered to voters through four propositions:

- Proposition 1 (\$67 million)**—includes funding for renovations to several municipal buildings including the Richardson Animal Shelter and Library, the replacement of Fire Station #3, the addition of a parking lot at the City's Fire Training Center, and the expansion and renovation of the Richardson Public Safety Complex.
- Proposition 2 (\$8.5 million)**—includes funding for street repair and rehabilitation. Money is also set aside for alley reconstruction, new traffic signals and battery backup units for the signals.
- Proposition 3 (\$7.2 million)**—includes money for the replacement of playground equipment at five parks, the expansion of hike and bike trails at Breckinridge Park and the Spring Creek Nature Area, renovations to the Senior Center and updates at the Canyon Creek Pool.
- Proposition 4 (\$2.2 million)**—includes funds to replace more than 10 miles of sidewalks.

Charter Amendment Election

Eighty-three charter amendment proposals will be included on the Nov. 3 ballot. Among the propositions is a decision for voters to approve or deny a change that would revise the procedure for filling Council vacancies (calling a special election for mayoral vacancies and having the Council appoint replacements for vacant Council seats, unless there are two Council seats vacant at which time a special election would be called). The majority of the rest of the proposals are language updates (some portions of the current Charter were written in the 1950s); capitalization and spelling updates; and eliminations of sections where state law now covers their intent.

The reason for the large number of propositions is due to the time that has passed since the last Charter review, which took place in 1989. In the 2015 Charter Amendment Election voters will also be asked to decide on a proposition that would require the appointment of a Charter Review Commission at least every 10 years

Voters to review bond package, charter

It may be late August, but this week early November has been on the minds of the Richardson City Council. That's because on Monday we approved calling for a bond and charter election to be held on Nov. 3.

The bond program would pay for many infrastructure projects and other repairs or upgrades for the city, and the charter election involves 83 propositions to make changes to the document that essentially serves as the Constitution for our community.

The bond election is broken out in to four propositions totaling \$115 million. The four propositions are focused on public buildings, streets, parks and sidewalks. If the proposals pass there would be no tax increase associated with them. The money to pay for the projects would come from the retirement of old bonds that are maturing.

The proposed amendments to the City Charter are based on feedback from the Charter Review Commission





that convened last October. The group was appointed to recommend changes and updates to the document, and in June, after meeting for six months meticulously going over the almost 50-page document, it reported its findings to the council. Among the recommended changes to be put before voters are revising the procedure for filling council vacancies (including calling a special election for a mayoral vacancy) and adding an article that a Charter Review Commission should be appointed at least every 10 years. Other changes are as simple as making it comply with Texas law or to correct spelling and grammatical mistakes.





Proposition 1
 Shall Section 3.03(a) of the Charter be amended to clarify that the city council consists of seven (7) members comprised of a mayor and six (6) council members and to add definitions for the words and phrases "city council", "council", "council member", "member of the city council", and "member of the council" to ensure consistent application and interpretation throughout the charter.
 Charter language if approved:
 Section 3.01. Number, election, terms. (b) Except as otherwise provided by this charter, if a person confirmed in the city shall be succeeded by a city council consisting of seven (7) members comprised of a mayor and six (6) council members. The members of the city council shall each be elected by the qualified voters of the entire City in numbered places in the manner provided in this charter for a term of two (2) years and until a successor is elected and qualified. It is used in this charter unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the word or phrase "city council", "council", "members of the city council" and "member of the council" means and includes the mayor and the six (6) council members. The word phrase "successor" or "term of membership" means the six (6) members of the city council on the date the mayor, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise.
 Impact:
 Clarifies governing body consists of mayor and six council members.
 Yes No

Proposition 2
 Shall Section 3.02 of the Charter be amended to define the last sentence referencing the mayor's term of office of two (2) years which is already stated in Section 3.01.
 Charter language if approved:
 Section 3.02. Mayor.
 The mayor shall be the presiding officer. The mayor shall serve on all matters coming before the council, shall have the power of veto, shall represent the city on all ceremonial occasions and shall be known as the official head of the government.
 Impact:
 Redundant statement deleted.
 Yes No

Proposition 3
 Shall Section 3.07 of the Charter be amended to provide that a vacancy in the office of mayor shall be filled by special election and the provision of Section 3.03 of the Charter providing for the mayor pro tem to assume the office of mayor in the event of a vacancy in the office of the mayor be repealed.
 Charter language if approved:
 Section 3.07. Council vacancies. (a) A vacancy in the office of the mayor shall be filled by special election to be held on the earliest date allowed by law for the purpose of allowing the qualified voters of the city to elect a person to serve the remainder of the unexpired term unless the date of the next general election for city council occurs first. Until the vacancy is filled in accordance with this section, the mayor pro tem shall perform the duties, but not assume the office, of mayor.
 Impact:
 An election will be held to fill vacancy in mayor's place.
 Yes No

Proposition 4
 Shall Section 3.07 of the Charter be amended to provide that vacancies in the office of the six (6) council members not including the mayor be filled by special election when there are two (2) or more vacancies of the six (6) council members unless the mayor, without amending the provision that allows the city council to fill by appointment a single vacancy in the office of council member, other than mayor.
 Charter language if approved:
 Section 3.07. Council vacancies. (b) Council members. Vacancies in the city council other than in the office of mayor, when the term does not exceed one (1) at any one time, shall be filled by appointment to the majority vote of the remaining members of the city council by a person meeting the qualifications of the charter to run for the remainder of the unexpired term. When there are two (2) or more vacancies at any one time, the vacancies shall be filled by special election to be held on the earliest date allowed by law for the purpose of allowing the qualified voters of the city to elect a person to serve the remainder of the unexpired term unless the date of the next general election for city council occurs first.
 Impact:
 When there are two or more vacancies on the city council, other than the mayor, an election will be held.

Proposition 5
 Shall Section 3.10 of the Charter relating to meetings of the city council being open to the public be amended to clarify that except for emergency called meetings and authorized closed meetings, it is the meetings of the city council which are open to the public or which otherwise are allowed by the rules of the city council to be heard in regard to any matter considered at such meetings.
 Charter language if approved:
 Section 3.10. Open meetings. (All meetings of the city council shall be open to the public, except as otherwise provided by state law, and the rules of the city council shall provide that with the exception of emergency meetings and authorized closed meetings of the city council, citizens of the city shall have a reasonable opportunity to be heard at the meetings of the city council, in regard to any matter there considered.)
 Impact:
 Public comments are allowed at all city council meetings except emergency and executive sessions.

Proposition 6
 Shall Section 3.11 of the Charter relating to the minimum number of members of the city council required to be present in order for the city council to hold a meeting be amended to clarify that the mayor is included in determining the required number for a quorum and to delete language not related to the definition of a quorum.
 Charter language if approved:
 Section 3.11. Quorum. A quorum of the council of five (5) members, except when the number of commissioners, due to vacancies, is reduced to less than five (5), in which event a quorum shall consist of all of the remaining commissioners but a number smaller than a quorum may adjourn from time to time and compel the attendance of absent members in accordance with and under such penalties as may be prescribed by ordinance.
 Impact:
 A quorum is five members of city council which may or may not include the mayor.

The members of the city council shall each be elected by the qualified voters of the entire City to numbered places in the manner provided in this charter for a term of two (2) years and until a successor is elected and qualified. As used in this charter, unless the context clearly means otherwise, the word or phrase “city council”, “council”, “member(s) of the city council” and “member(s) of the council” means and includes the mayor and the six (6) council members. The word or phrase “councilmember(s)” or “council member(s)” means the six (6) members of the city council excluding the mayor, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise.
Impact:
 Clarifies governing body consists of mayor and six council members.

The City of Richardson adopted a home rule charter in June of 1956 establishing the council/manager form of government still in place today. A revised charter was approved in 1989 and was amended in 2007 and 2012. The Richardson City Council has called for a City Charter Amendment election Nov. 3, 2015 that will include 83 amendments. The following information details the proposed amendments, the current City Charter language, the language if approved and the anticipated impact.

 Shall Section 3.07 of the Charter be amended to provide that a vacancy in the office of mayor shall be filled by special election and the provisions of Section 3.03 of the Charter providing for the mayor pro tem to assume the office of mayor in the event of a vacancy in the office of the mayor be repealed.
Charter language if approved:
Section 3.07. Council vacancies.
 (a) Mayor. A vacancy in the office of the mayor shall be filled by special election to be held on the earliest date allowed by law for the purpose of allowing the qualified voters of the city to elect a person to serve the remainder of the unexpired term unless the date of the next general election for city council occurs first. Until the vacancy is filled in accordance with this section, the mayor pro tem shall perform the duties, but not assume the office, of mayor.
Impact:
 An election will be held to fill vacancy in mayor's place.

 b) Council members. When there are two (2) or more vacancies at any one time, the vacancies shall be filled by special election to be held on the earliest date allowed by law for the purpose of allowing the qualified voters of the city to elect a person to serve the remainder of the unexpired term unless the date of the next general election for city council occurs first.
Impact:
 When there are two or more vacancies on the city council, other than the mayor, an election will be held.

 Shall Section 3.10 of the Charter relating to meetings of the city council being open to the public be amended to clarify that, except for emergency called meetings and authorized closed meetings, it is the meetings of the city council which are open to the public at which citizens are allowed by the rules of the city council to be heard in regard to any matter considered at such meetings.
Charter language if approved:
Section 3.10. Open meetings.
 All meetings of the city council shall be open to the public, except as otherwise permitted by state law, and the rules of the city council shall provide that with the exception of emergency meetings and authorized closed meetings of the city council, citizens of the city shall have a reasonable opportunity to be heard at the meetings of the city council, in regard to any matter there considered.

 Public comments are allowed at all city council meetings except emergency and executive sessions.

 A quorum is five members of city council which may or may not include the mayor.







State of Richardson's Roads
More than 80 percent of the City's roadways are more than 20 years old, with half of those age 40 years and older. The typical design life for a concrete road is 25 years, which is why roadway rehabilitation is the largest part of the Proposition 1 project list. Alley segments with a PCI score of 50 or lower, and street segments with a score of 50 or lower, have been selected for repair.

Traffic control devices
The traffic control devices portion of Proposition 1 includes the installation of wireless communication capability at all of the City's 123 traffic signals to connect with the City's fiber optic network. The system would be able to support traffic signals, traffic video, water security systems, wireless meter reading, police and fire mobile data, national field applications and serve as redundant links to back up other services. Traffic signal communications allow personnel to view and evaluate traffic conditions via video and adjust signal timing from the Traffic Management Center without deploying technicians to the field. Of the City's 123 traffic signals, 57 intersections are in need of some level of signal reconstruction. The equipment at seven signals has recently been replaced. 11 signals are being rebuilt through shared Congestion Management Air Quality funds, the 2006 Bond Program, the Back Row development and TADOT, and five signals are included in the proposed intersection improvement locations, also a part of Proposition 1. The 2010 Bond Proposal calls for the complete reconstruction of 14 of the highest ranked signals in need of replacement. The next 20 highest ranked signals would receive new signal control cabinets, battery back-up units and new wiring.
